ABOUT THE AUTHOR

Oscar Wilde, in full Oscar Fingal O'Flahertie Wills Wilde, (born October 16, 1854, Dublin, Ireland—died November 30, 1900, Paris, France), Irish wit, poet, and dramatist whose reputation rests on his only novel, *The Picture of Dorian Gray* (1891), and on his comic masterpieces *Lady Windermere's Fan* (1892) and *The Importance of Being Earnest* (1895). He was a spokesman for the late 19th-century Aesthetic movement in England, which advocated art for art's sake.




THEME

Of Oscar Wilde's various short works for children, 'The Happy Prince' (1888) occupies a special place as his signature tale, and is perhaps Wilde's definitive statement about the relationship between inner and outer beauty. 'The Happy Prince' is a sad tale that clearly owes much to earlier fairy stories, especially the tales of Hans Christian Andersen. However, it is also a typically Wildean story.



THE SEAMSTRESS EPISODE

- The Happy Prince told the swallow that there lived a woman far away. She was a seamstress.
- She was embroidering flowers on the satin gown of the Queen's maid of honour.
- The maid was to wear it at the next Court ball. In the bed, there lay ill her little boy.
- He was suffering from fever.
- The Happy Prince asked the swallow to pick the ruby from his sword hilt. He should give that to the woman.



THE SWALLOWS FLIES TO HELP

- The Swallow reluctantly agrees.
- He picked up the ruby and flew to the woman's house. He put the ruby near the woman's thimble.
- He also fanned the boy's forehead. The boy felt a bit better. He sank into a deep slumber.
- When he returns, he tells the Happy Prince what he has done and that he feels warm, even though the air is cold.
- The Happy Prince tells him that he has been warmed inside because he has done a good deed.



THE POOR PLAYWRIGHT EPISODE

- The next day, the Swallow prepares to bid the Happy Prince farewell as he must fly to Egypt to join his friends.
- But the Happy Prince persuades him to take the sapphire out of one of his eye sockets
- And take it to the poor young man who is so poor he is freezing in his garret
- He cannot finish the play he is writing.




THE HAPPY PRINCE GIVES AWAY A SAPPHIRE

- Once again, the Swallow does as the statue requests .
- Though again, he does so reluctantly,
- This time because he doesn't want to rob the Happy Prince of one of his eyes.



THE SWALLOW RETURNS TO THE HAPPY PRINCE

- The playwright saw the sapphire. He was happy. Now he hoped to finish the play.
