

PARTS OF A SENTENCE



SENTENCE

A group of words that express a complete idea, is called sentence.

EXAMPLE

**My name is Sara. I have a car.
You are my friend.**



A sentence starts with a capital letter and ends with
a full stop(.)
a question mark (?) or
an exclamation mark (!)

Every sentence has two *essential* parts:

subject

and

predicate

The **subject** of a sentence is the part about which something is being said.

The flower bloomed.



Bob painted.

The girls on the team were all good students.

The **predicate** of a sentence is the part which says something about the subject.


Bill **told everyone about the wreck.**



Mary **sobbed.**

Sue **plays the piano well.**
